Education Recap

Education at the NALS of Oregon Annual Meeting was again wonderful and plentiful.

Beginning with the topic "Foreclosures" was Helen Nelson AAL. Ms. Nelson discussed lenders, borrower and investors, mortgages, Promissory Notes and Trust Deeds. She noted that ORS 88 outlines Oregon Law on judicial foreclosures and ORS 86 describes Trust Deeds and non-judicial foreclosures.



She discussed the traps and pitfalls that can occur with the foreclosure process noting that a sale after foreclosure is not necessarily the end of the foreclosure. There is a redemption period to be aware of. People have bought foreclosed homes and moved in to them, remodeling and updating them only to have the property redeemed at the last moment.

In Oregon, there is a Resolution conference first. The property owner must meet with the bank and try to find a solution. For example, can the loan be modified? She also noted that when people are in default, they often will not open their mail and do not know they may have other options by law. They do not know that the resolution conference is available. Non-judicial foreclosures check for bankruptcy or military service. If they are on active duty, it is harder to foreclose.

Ms. Nelson advised that a person should always get a Title report for notice purposes and check deed records. If there is going to be a public sale on the courthouse steps, notice must be published weekly for 4 weeks with the last publication at least 2 weeks before the sale in the county where the property is located. On the date of sale, there must be a person on the courthouse steps. There must be a public proclamation if there is a postponement.

A bankruptcy may stop the public sale temporarily.

Ms. Nelson pointed out that if there was a manufactured home on the foreclosed property, to make certain it is incorporated as part of the real property. Otherwise, it is personal property.

She also discussed occupancy of the property. Is the buyer living in the home or is it a tenant? If it is a tenant, then the law under ORS 90 applies.

Ms. Nelson's presentation covered many more areas on the topic of foreclosures including Sheriff's Sales, land sale contracts and junior liens. Obviously, in foreclosures cases, it is imperative that a person has an attorney.

Thank you, Ms. Nelson for your very informative presentation.

The second presentation on Friday afternoon was "DUI/Dram Shop" presented by Cate Duke, the Director of MADD Oregon.

Ms. Duke noted that ORS 471.565 discusses the liability laws for the state of Oregon. She noted that the dram shop laws date back to 1880 England. She also said that in the United States there are still nine states that do not have dram shop laws.

Ms. Duke discussed wrongful death claims, injury claims and the notice requirement under ORS. 471565. She also discussed the difficulty of holding a premises liable for injuries or death caused as a result of providing beverage service to an individual.

Ms. Duke joined MADD in 2012 and believes in the cause because she had lost her fiancé to a drunk driver. She noted that nationwide almost half of traffic accidents are alcohol or drug related. She said that Oregon's has had a reduction but also said now there is concern about drugged driving.

Thank you for your presentation to our NALS group. It is much appreciated.



Microsoft Office Tips & Tricks was presented by our own Traci Kerian, PP, PLS-SC. The first thing that she let everyone know was that if you are still using Windows 7 operating system, that as of January 1, 2020, there will be no more updates and that support is ending for that product.

Again, Traci led us through a PowerPoint and demonstrated highlighting techniques, Widescreen features and how to use the Snipping Tool. I particularly liked the “inserting documents” feature which I can use to create the Summons. Also, (and why didn’t I think of this myself) the Alternate Signature feature is a great idea. For example, you can create an “out of office” signature.

Traci demonstrated other options such as quick steps, formatting a judge’s signature line for Word and clearing formatting.

Traci is now my “go too girl” (I know, I know, “girl” is inappropriate) for all things Microsoft.



Thank you Traci for taking your time to continue to share your knowledge with others. Obviously, you are not busy enough.

Education began again on Saturday morning with a presentation by attorney Jacy Arnold from Eugene who spoke about Complex Business/Divorce. First, she commended the attendees for their diligence in continuing their legal education and noted how important a learned assistant is to an attorney. Ms. Arnold pointed out that legal assistants and paralegals must be issue spotters. Wow! Who knew there were so many things to look for? Important things to pay attention to: What are the assets? What type of assets are they? Is there an LLC? An inheritance? What were the pre-marital assets? Is there a business? Is there a home-based business such as Etsy or other on-line business? When did it start? What is each partner’s contribution to the business? Are their licenses? Certifications? Permits like a salmon permit? Are there pre or postnuptial agreements? Is there a Family Trust? The Trust may need to be added as a party. Be sure to add the Trust to your conflict list. Are there taxes and are they paid or still owed?

When handling complex divorces, Ms. Arnold discusses that it is necessary to get pre-assignment of the judge because they should be notified. It may be necessary to get a case scheduling order. Lane County, for example, has three “commercial” judges who handle complex litigation.

Ms. Arnold noted in complex divorces that asset valuations become stale after about 6 months so it is important to make sure valuations are current. She suggests getting a Request for Production early to get expert evaluations.

She also stated that she prepares a “motion for a court reporter” for the trial at least in high value or high stakes cases. She sometimes negotiates a “sitting fee” with the Court Reporter for long trials.

She talked about the importance of keeping all pertinent documents at the office and have the client come in to review them. She also tells her clients to do no social media during the pendency of the case, stating that posted statements are non-hearsay statements and can be used in court. Do not allow children on social media either. She also advises that the client not discuss the case with anyone, including friends, parents, children or confidants. They can be subpoenaed into court to testify against the client.

Ms. Arnold advised keeping a discovery guide sheet which can be attached to a motion to compel. She also said to always have an index for the paperwork; pleadings, discovery, subpoenas and most import...proofs of service.

She asked if your office has a “war room”, which is a designated conference room to keep all files and binders for the complex litigation case?

Last, she discussed experts such as custody evaluators, business evaluators, retirement evaluators, financial consultants, real property and personal property evaluators. She advised that you keep an Excel sheet, for example, of all experts and keep it updated as needed. And ALWAYS check with your experts before scheduling depositions. You may want them to sit in on these dates.

Thank you Ms. Arnold for your well-prepared and informative educational seminar.

80% of all civil legal needs go unmet

The “Limited License Legal Technician/UCC Paralegal Program” seminar was presented by attorney Danny Lang. His first order of business was to note how dependent all attorney are on their staff and thanked NALS for continuing to educate its members.

Mr. Lang has been on an advisory board for the Oregon State Bar Association as they review the need for legal alternatives. It is estimated that 80% of civil needs go unmet by people who cannot afford to pay an attorney.



(Economic discrimination?) Mr. Lang noted that attorney fees in the state of Oregon average a low of \$250 an hour, which many people simply cannot pay. Add to that the fact that legal resources which once were available to low income people, such as the Oregon Law Center, no longer have adequate funding. Prior to 2008, the IOLTA funded the OLC. The interest rate on attorney trust accounts



earned about 5%. Today, interest rates are less than 1% and the funding of the OLC has declined as well. Internet sites such as Legal Zoom often fall short. In fact, it is estimated that 63,000,000 people cannot afford legal services (about 1/5 of the population).

To that

end the Oregon State Bar has been discussing LLLT (Limited License Legal Technician) certification. This is already a pilot program in Washington. An LLLT must be over 18 and good moral character, have an Associate's Degree, Paralegal or higher and have licensing obligations.

Mr. Lang also pointed out that there is a paralegal program in the Roseburg area at Umpqua Community College.

Thank you Mr. Lang for spending your Saturday with us. We appreciate your donated time and expertise in this area.

Sunday morning education was Ethics. It was really a presentation of what a legal assistant should NEVER do as Amy Riedling, PP, PLS-SC recounted the tale of "Bubba the Live Sponge v. Schnitts in Florida.

The entire issue is easily found on the internet. A summary would be that the legal assistant for "Bubba's" firm (A&D) and opposing council (CB) had a trial scheduled on the next day. A paralegal who worked for A&D tried to set up opposing counsel (CB) for a DUI. She had seen CB go into a restaurant and order a drink.

She contacted her employer at A&D and she was told to do whatever she could to get CB to drink and drive because it was well-known that CB had a previous DUI. She communicated with her employer via voice calls or text message 108 times in less than two hours for instructions on the set up.. Her employer A&D contacted a friend who worked on the police department DUI Unit to have him wait outside the restaurant. A&D and the officer communicated via text 92 times, although it was later discovered that the police officer's text messages were "accidently" erased from his phone.

As previously mentioned, the trial for A&D and CB was set for the next day. CB did not know that the paralegal worked for A&D. The paralegal flirted and kept enticing CB to drink and then go somewhere else for a drink. But CB kept refusing. After a couple hours of drinking, the paralegal finally convinced CB to at least move and park her car across the street because she was too drunk to move it herself and she wanted the car left in a more secure area. CB relented and drove the car across the street to park it. The police were waiting and CB got arrested for a DUI and goes to jail. CB's had inadvertently left his trial notebook in the paralegal's car. She took the trial notebook to her employer, A&D, where they held it for 17 hours. The paralegal then goes home and tells everyone how she and her bosses set up CB for the arrest.

At the conclusion of this fiasco, the entire law firm ended up suspended because of multiple ethics violations. In fact, the Florida Supreme Court said that their actions were "among the most shocking, unethical and unprofessional" they had ever witnessed by lawyers.

The Officer was terminated from the police force. The paralegal is searching for another position, probably not in law. It is rumored that the disbarred attorneys are now radio talk show hosts.

Asparagus FritTata

INGREDIENTS

9 spears pencil-thin asparagus
 3 tablespoons olive oil
 1 large red onion, cut into 1/4-inch-thick slices
 Pinch sugar
 3/4 teaspoon kosher or sea salt, plus extra for water
 3/4 cup Parmigiano-Reggiano cheese, coarsely grated
 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
 6 large eggs, lightly beaten

INSTRUCTIONS

Wash and trim asparagus. Cut into 3/4-inch lengths. Cook in boiling, salted water until tender, 3–4 minutes. Drain asparagus and submerge in ice water to stop cooking. Set aside.

In a medium-size oven-safe skillet, heat olive oil over moderate heat. Add onion, sugar, and salt; reduce heat to medium-low, and cook, stirring occasionally, until onion is golden brown and very tender, about 30 minutes. Remove onion from the pan with tongs, leaving as much oil in the pan as possible. Let onion sit 10 minutes, until no longer hot.

In a large bowl, whisk eggs until smooth. Add cheese, pepper, asparagus, and onion. Set the skillet over medium heat. Add egg mixture, stirring briefly to distribute fillings.

Reduce heat to low and let mixture cook slowly; you should see just a few lazy bubbles popping up around the edges. Cook undisturbed until edges are set but middle is still very liquid, about 8 minutes. Meanwhile, preheat your broiler on high.

Transfer skillet to oven, positioning it 3–4 inches from the broiler. Cook until top of frittata is golden brown, edges are puffed, and center is just set (it will jiggle slightly but pop right back after you poke it), about 2 minutes. Don't overcook it! Loosen with a spatula, if needed. Remove to a warmed platter and



serve immediately.

YIELD: 4 servings

PREPARATION TIME: 40 minutes

START TO FINISH TIME: 60 minutes

Integrity and high standards of conduct are fundamental to the success of our professional association. This Code is promulgated by the NALS and accepted by its members to accomplish these ends.

Canon 1. Members of this association shall maintain a high degree of competency and integrity through continuing education to better assist the legal profession in fulfilling its duty to provide quality legal services to the public.

Canon 2. Members of this association shall maintain a high standard of ethical conduct and shall contribute to the integrity of the association and the legal profession.

Canon 3. Members of this association shall avoid a conflict of interest pertaining to a client matter.

Canon 4. Members of this association shall preserve and protect the confidences and privileged communications of a client.

Canon 5. Members of this association shall exercise care in using independent professional judgment and in determining the extent to which a client may be assisted without the presence of a lawyer and shall not act in matters involving professional legal judgment.

Canon 6. Members of this association shall not solicit legal business on behalf of a lawyer.

Canon 7. Members of this association, unless permitted by law, shall not perform paralegal functions except under the direct supervision of a lawyer and shall not advertise or contract with members of the general public for the performance of paralegal functions.

Canon 8. Members of this association, unless permitted by law, shall not perform any of the duties restricted to lawyers or do things which lawyers themselves may not do and shall assist in preventing the unauthorized practice of law.

Canon 9. Members of this association not licensed to practice law shall not engage in the practice of law as defined by statutes or court decisions.

Canon 10. Members of this association shall do all other things incidental, necessary, or expedient to enhance professional responsibility and participation in the administration of justice and public service in cooperation with the legal profession.
